## Workshop summary

The importance of biodiversity for poverty alleviation provides opportunities for building bridges between the conservation and development community and achieve win-win outcomes. Recent work in the UK and internationally has focused on assessing the strength of the evidence for biodiversity-poverty linkages and mainstreaming the evidence into development and planning policies.

The workshop was hosted by The Cambridge Conservation Initiative (CCI) and facilitated by UNEP World Conservation Monitoring Centre (UNEP-WCMC). The aim was to provide a forum for conservation and development researchers/practitioners to meet and discuss recent and planned work within the field of conservation and poverty interactions.

This workshop provided an ideal opportunity to initiate and strengthen joint work in light of the upcoming call for the CCI Collaborative Fund and to discuss further opportunities for collaborative work.


